CBH LIFELONG LEARNING

What makes us Jewish? Our Torah!

The first 5 books of the Hebrew Bible are our beating heart. So please join us for this lively study. We read and schmooze, argue and laugh, and search for meaning inside and outside of the text. **Torah Study** happens 9:00am Shabbat mornings, in the CBH library and online.

Can one hour change your life? Find out!

10:00am Saturdays join us for the **Shabbat Morning Learning** hour. Our guest teachers explore topics that deepen our understanding of what it means to live a Jewish life, anything from studying the customs of Rosh Chodesh to delving into Dara Horn's complex book 'People Love Dead Jews'.



But that's not all!

We read the Talmud, the codification of Jewish Law. We discuss related arguments Rabbis have made searching for justifications and explanations on the nature of Torah, life and the will of God. **Talmud Study** meets twice a month, once on Wednesday evening and once at noon on Saturday.

And we explore the parts of the Bible they didn't teach you in Hebrew School. We call it **Tantalizing Torah**. We learn about these characters and all their attributes and flaws when we delve into the *Tanakh*. Class meets the second Wednesday of the month, 1:00pm.
