The Home We Build Together

A few years ago, the CBH board created a new vision statement. Together, the group decided we wanted to "Create a Jewish home where every individual is known, accepted, and cared for."

The pandemic has made it very difficult for us to live that vision. For too long, we have been away from our Jewish home, not only away from the physical building, but apart from each other. How can each individual be known, accepted, and cared for when we have so few opportunities to connect?

This is our challenge in the coming year – to rebuild our Jewish home. We have chosen the theme: Brit Kehillah – Covenantal Community – to remind us that we are a community and that we have responsibilities to each other.

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks defines covenant as "a binding commitment to care for each other, while respecting the freedom, integrity, and difference of each person." In a covenantal community, individuals come together for a common good, "the good of all of us together."

Rabbi Sacks uses the metaphor of "The home we build together" to describe the kinds of communities and societies we need today. Not a country house where we are invited for the weekend or a hotel where we stay for a night, but a home where we belong because we have planned it and worked for it and built it together.

We need each other. We need to reconnect, to renew old relationships and create new ones. We need to share our ideas and energy and passion. We need to sing together, eat together, schmooze and learn and struggle together.

I don't think I can repeat it too many times: We need each other. Please come home.

What is Community?

Once again the High Holidays have arrived. We are still moving through a pandemic–it's better, but it's not over, and nothing is the same. This year our theme is **Brit Kehillah** – Covenantal Community. But what is a community, a Jewish Community?

Twenty six years ago, I, along with other strangers, some Jewish and some not, living in various New Jersey towns, converged at Beth Hatikvah with one goal: seeking a Jewish community, a Jewish home. We sought our shared historical past, shared religious and cultural practices, shared goals and values, and our connection to the Jewish people. We created a Jewish home, each person contributing to make Beth Hatikvah a welcoming place, based on Jewish values.

Perhaps the past two and a half years of disruption, disconnection and distance, have made you forget your experience of CBH as your Jewish home? Look around you! Many of us were strangers from different towns, but we found our way here, seeking a Jewish community. We are a diverse group and Beth Hatikvah is our home. At CBH our needs are met, and we feel needed. Our diversity allows us to experience and participate in age-old rituals in original and meaningful ways. We are a Jewish community. We receive. We give. We connect.

This year High Holiday honors were given to non-leadership volunteers, our "unsung heroes" who help make CBH a Jewish home for all our members. People who make things happen, people who say "yes." People who say "I can help." People who share new ideas and initiate projects. People who say, "What can I do?" These members represent all of us who have struggled to strengthen and fortify our Jewish community.

Brit Kehillah – when what you offer, when the talents, skills and time you give, feel valued--then you know that you are part of a community. You know that you are home. CBH is here with open arms. We are waiting for you....

Aiding Refugee Families

Several CBH members are tutoring the children of families who have immigrated to the United States. There are two Afghani families, one in Roselle and one in Elizabeth. We have also continued working with a Syrian family who had to be evacuated from Elizabeth during the big storm in September 2021; they were relocated to Jackson, NJ until they are allowed to return to their Elizabeth apartment. While the children have all returned to school, we continue to tutor virtually either because not everyone has been vaccinated or because the family is temporarily living too far away. Feeding the Hungry

It might come as a surprise to some that there are people right here in Summit who experience food insecurity. SHIP (Summit Helping Its People) is an organized group of volunteers who come together to feed our neighbors who are hungry. SHIP provides breakfasts and lunches on weekdays and dinners on the weekends. On the first Sunday of every month, CBH partners with SHIP to provide that day's dinner. While the pandemic has changed how SHIP runs things, we have nevertheless been able to provide that monthly meal without interruption. Members of our congregation buy food and cook, then deliver the food to SHIP staff for distribution. If you like to cook with your kids, this is a great way to introduce them to the idea that Tikkun Olam is not only about putting coins in the tzedakah can, but also about putting in time and effort. We all share in the work so no one has to do it all and you don't have to sign up every month, only when you are able. So cook with your family or friends and fulfill a mitzvah at the same time! LIFE LONG LEARNING

Torah Study: If you're looking for a deep dive into the richness of Torah, you'll find it in this lively, engaging program. A friendly, committed group meets every Shabbat from 9:00 to 10:00 am (except when there is a Shabbat morning service), to explore the Torah portion of the week, facilitated by Rabbi Orden, Rabbinic Intern Molly Paul, or one of our inspiring lay leaders. Bring us your questions! We can't promise they will all be answered, but they will always be honored.

Covenant of Community Series: This year's CBH theme will be our springboard one Shabbat morning each month, taught by Rabbinic Intern Molly Paul. We will explore the idea of covenant – what it means, and the many ways it shows up in our texts, in our traditions, and in our communities. We will also consider themes and topics such as: how does obligation impact our sense of belonging and community, how is chosenness in conversation with covenant, and whether covenant is still relevant and how it manifests in our lives today.

Rosh Chodesh Series: Using source books from Chai Mitzvah, Rabbi Orden will be teaching on Rosh Chodesh, a long-standing interest of hers. Rosh Chodesh is the name given to the first day of every month in the Hebrew calendar. Chai Mitzvah provides traditional and contemporary texts to spark conversation and learning about what each month can teach us.

Guest Speakers: On many Shabbat mornings, you'll find us hosting fascinating guests who share insights on a range of issues important to Jewish life.

Talmud Study: We read the Talmud, the codification of Jewish Law. We discuss related arguments Rabbis have made for centuries, searching for justifications and explanations on the nature of Torah, life, and the will of God. We debate, argue, speculate and enjoy lively, stimulating discussions. We meet twice a month: once Wednesday evening and once Saturday at noon. We hope you'll join us.

Tantalizing Torah: Explore the parts of the Bible they didn't teach you in Hebrew School. Come to know the characters and their stories in a unique way – as they come to life with all their attributes and flaws when each class delves into the *Tanakh*. No knowledge of Hebrew required. Class meets the second Wednesday of the month, 1:00 pm.

New Ark at Congregation Beth Hatikvah



The Hebrew phrase on the Ark is "Let every soul praise God." This new Ark will house our three scrolls throughout the year and will also accommodate our Holocaust scroll during the High Holidays.

The branches are representative of the Torah as a tree of life. The pomegranates are there because in Judaism their numerous seeds represent the 613 commandments. Thousands of years ago, our ancestors built the first ark. They placed the tablets with God's commandments inside and carried it with them in the wilderness. They called it the ark of the covenant because it held instructions for how to maintain good relationships with God, with other people, and with the land.

It is perfect that our new ark coincides with our theme this year, which is Brit Kehillah. As we focus on our covenant with each other and our connections to Jews throughout the ages, we have this gorgeous visual symbol of covenant.

Our ark is new, but it still contains the ancient wisdom of the Torah. The ark not only represents the future of our specific Beth Hatikvah community, but also our connection with the past and with Jews throughout the world.


